MISSION

Intersection of Change (IOC) strengthens West Baltimore through recovery housing, arts education, and community revitalization.

IOC operates three interconnected programs that expand health, safety, learning, and opportunity:

Martha's Place

Long-term recovery housing and wraparound services for women overcoming substance use and homelessness.

Jubilee Arts

Multigenerational arts education, exhibitions, and youth workforce pathways, including Youth in Business.

Strength to Love II

A 1.5-acre urban farm with 14 high-tunnel greenhouses that advances food access and workforce development.

Our programs operated year-round to serve the Sandtown-Winchester, Upton, and surrounding West Baltimore communities using our own program staff plus strong partnerships with fellow community nonprofits, government, schools, others.

- Four seasonal terms of classes in ceramics, visual arts, dance, and business, plus monthly exhibits and public showcases.
- Youth in Business: Teens designed, produced, and sold original products by organizing and participating in public sales events. Alumni mentors supported current participants.

Safe, stable recovery housing with case management, financial education, wellness classes, and employment guidance.

- Long-term successful recovery rate of 60% since 2005 as defined by leaving the program clean and sober with a job and housing
- Volunteers led in-home recovery groups, planned celebration events, and facilitated social gatherings that helped strengthen peer connection and reduce isolation.

Year-round 1.5 acre farm addressed food access and workforce development programming.

- Harvest distributed through a partnership with the Maryland Food Bank, direct sales, CSA shares, and farmers' markets.

- Compost bins created to process donations of food waste and to work toward our goal of creating a robust composting system.
