Intersection of Change (IOC) strengthens West Baltimore through recovery housing, arts, workforce development, food access, and community revitalization.

IOC operates three interconnected programs that expand health, safety, learning and opportunity:

Martha's Place

Long-term recovery housing and wraparound services for women overcoming substance use and homelessness.

Jubilee Arts

Multigenerational arts education, exhibitions, and youth workforce pathways

Strength to Love II

A 1.5-acre urban farm with 14 high-tunnel greenhouses that advance food access and workforce development.
